You can start any time before kindergarten!***



- 2) With paper log sheets


Both formats have the same milestones and prizes, so you can pick your preferred way to log books and track your progress. You can even use both! Caregivers may like the app because they can track book titles, whereas youngsters often benefit from the tactile experience of coloring in bubbles on the paper log sheets.

## Getting Started

After you have registered your child, you can pick up a tote bag from the Children's Library that contains reading log sheets and additional information about the program.

If you plan to use READsquared, visit [www.lakeforestlibrary.org/readquared](http://www.lakeforestlibrary.org/readquared) or download the app and enroll in the 1000 Books program. Once you have signed up on READsquared, you can start logging your books!



## Milestones & Prizes

Milestones and prizes are the same whether you log on paper or with READsquared.

Each time your child finishes one level of the program by reading 100 books, stop by the Children's Library for a sticker and photo shoot. (Total of 10 stickers and 10 photo shoots.) If you're logging on READsquared, you also get a digital badge for each 100 books you read.

When your child has reached the milestones of 300 books and 700 books, they can pick up a small prize in the Children's Library.

When your child has completed 1000 books before kindergarten, they will receive a certificate of completion, a book of their choice, and an invitation to a graduation party!

# GROWING READERS Early Literacy Practices



## READ



- Prepare your child to be a successful reader by reading with them every day.
- Books contain rich language that we do not typically use in conversation, which will broaden your child's vocabulary.
- Have conversations with your child about books. Point out pictures and ask open-ended questions. Be patient while waiting for responses and expand on your child's responses with more comments and questions.
- Point out and talk about the elements of a book, such as the title, author, and illustrator.

## WRITE



- Both reading and writing represent the spoken word.
- Plan activities that promote fine motor skill development.
- Set aside time to draw with your child and ask them to tell you about their picture.
- Write your child's name and point out each letter. Emphasize the sound of the first letter in their name.
- Create a book and have your child draw pictures to tell a story. Then, have your child tell you the story and write parts of the story underneath their pictures.



## SING

- Singing to your child slows down language, making it easier for them to hear sounds in words.
- Singing is a great way to teach your child new vocabulary.
- Sing to your child and act out the motions to songs such as the ABC song, "Mary Had A Little Lamb," "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star," and "London Bridge Is Falling Down."
- Clap, bounce, or tap along to the rhythm of a song.

## TALK


- Talk and interact with your child as much as possible throughout the day.
- Talking with your child helps build their vocabulary, which will positively impact their ability to comprehend the text they read.
- Talk about anything and everything, including something you are doing, putting away, or passing by, and ask your child open-ended questions about these experiences.
- Be an attentive listener when your child talks to you. Even if they are too young to make words or sentences, listen to what they say and respond as you would in a conversation.

## PLAY




- Play is essential to a child's social, emotional, and physical development. It is how they learn about the world.
- Children learn how to problem solve, think critically and creatively, communicate, compromise, and much more during playtime!
- Make connections with stories or real life experiences during playtime.
- Provide props, such as stuffed animals, puppets, costumes, dolls, and real life items with print like newspapers and food containers.

Rhyming text introduces air travel, from the airport to the flight deck, with information about how planes fly, safety rules, in-flight entertainment, and air traffic control.









The three pigs escape the wolf by going into another world where they meet the cat and the fiddle, the cow that jumped over the moon, and a dragon.




