Along the way, your librarians are here to support you and cheer you on. Built into the program are reading logs, book recommendations, child development information, prizes, and celebrations, all to help you track your progress and stay motivated.

2 ways to participate

1) Online and with an app using Beanstack

2) With paper log sheets

Both formats have the same milestones and prizes, so you can pick your preferred way to log books and track your progress. You can even use both!

Caregivers may like the app because they can track book titles, whereas youngsters often benefit from the tactile experience of coloring in bubbles on the paper log sheets.

All 1000 Books participants need to create an account on Beanstack. After joining the 1000 Books program in Beanstack, you do not need to use Beanstack further if you prefer to only use paper forms.

Log Books on Paper


1. Have your child color in a bubble on your log sheet for every book you have read together. Each log sheet contains 100 bubbles, representing one level of the program.
2. When one of your child's log sheets is complete, stop by the Children's Library to pick up your prize and do your photo shoot.

Log Books on Beanstack

1. Open and log in to Beanstack.
2. Follow the prompts to log your books.

Reading Milestones

1. Each time your child finishes one level of the program by reading 100 books, stop by the Children's Library for a sticker, a small prize from the treasure chest, and a photo shoot. If you're logging on Beanstack, you also get a digital badge for each 100 books you read.
2. When your child has read 500 books, visit the Children's Library for their sticker, photo shoot, and treasure chest prize, plus an additional prize to celebrate being halfway through the program.
3. When your child has completed 1000 books before kindergarten, they will also receive a book of their choice to keep the reading waves rolling!
4. Stay tuned to the Library newsletter and web calendar. Periodically we host a 1000 Books Before Kindergarten Party with a storytime, a celebration of 1000 Books finishers, and an opportunity for new children to register. When the time comes, be sure to register for the party and join us for fun galore!




GROWING READERS

Early Literacy Practices

READ

- Prepare your child to be a successful reader by reading with them every day.
- Books contain rich language that we do not typically use in conversation, which will broaden your child's vocabulary.
- Have conversations with your child about books. Point out pictures and ask open-ended questions. Be patient while waiting for responses and expand on your child's responses with more comments and questions.
- Point out and talk about the elements of a book, such as the title, author, and illustrator.



WRITE

- Both reading and writing represent the spoken word.
- Plan activities that promote fine motor skill development.
- Set aside time to draw with your child and ask them to tell you about their picture.
- Write your child's name and point out each letter. Emphasize the sound of the first letter in their name.
- Create a book and have your child draw pictures to tell a story. Then, have your child tell you the story and write parts of the story underneath their pictures.



SING

- Singing to your child slows down language, making it easier for them to hear sounds in words.
- Singing is a great way to teach your child new vocabulary.
- Sing to your child and act out the motions to songs such as the ABC song, "Mary Had A Little Lamb," "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star," and "London Bridge Is Falling Down."
- Clap, bounce, or tap along to the rhythm of a song.

TALK


- Talk and interact with your child as much as possible throughout the day,
- Talking with your child helps build their vocabulary, which will positively impact their ability to comprehend the text they read.
- Talk about anything and everything, including something you are doing, putting away, or passing by, and ask your child open-ended questions about these experiences.
- Be an attentive listener when your child talks to you. Even if they are too young to make words or sentences, listen to what they say and respond as you would in a conversation.



PLAY

- Play is essential to a child's social, emotional, and physical development. It is how they learn about the world.
- Children learn how to problem solve, think critically and creatively, communicate, compromise, and much more during playtime!
- Make connections with stories or real life experiences during playtime.
- Provide props, such as stuffed animals, puppets, costumes, dolls, and real life items with print like newspapers and food containers.


